Allan Brimicombe is a Chartered Geographer, a Fellow of the Royal Statistical, Royal Geographical and Geological Societies, a Director of the British Society of Criminology, and is an Academician of the Academy of Social Sciences. Allan pioneered the use of geo-information systems (GIS) and environmental simulation modelling. His other research interests include data quality issues, spatial data mining and analysis, and location-based services (LBS). These have been applied to crime, health, education, natural hazards, utilities and business. He lectures in research methods and data science. Allan is a member of *Crime and Criminal Justice Transparency Sector Panel* which provides advice to the transparency delivery teams for crime data in the Home Office, and criminal justice data in the Ministry of Justice. He is also a non-executive member of the National Statistician's *Crime Statistics Advisory Committee* which advises the Home Secretary, Her Majesty's Inspectorate of Constabulary and the Office of National Statistics on all matters relating to the collection and publication of crime statistics. Allan has recently been appointed as a Specialist Advisor to the *House of Lords Select Committee on Olympic and Paralympic Legacy*. This follows work since 2009 on the Olympic Games Impact Studies commissioned by the ESRC on behalf of the International Olympic Committee.
