The seminar will discuss changes in the context of policing that not only transforms its complexity but pushes it away from "policing with consent". It will argue the plausibility of this thesis and then suggest what needs to be done to avoid a decline in legitimacy. The presentation will draw particularly on American experience, but argue that similar developments can be seen in other Common-Law democracies, like Australia, Britain, Canada, India, and New Zealand.

David Bayley is a specialist in international criminal justice, with particular interest in policing. He has done extensive research in India, Japan, Australia, Canada, Britain, Singapore, and the United States. His work has focused on police reform, accountability, foreign assistance to police agencies, and crime-prevention strategies. He has served as a consultant to the U.S. government and the United Nations on police reform in Bosnia. He was a member of the international Oversight Commission for the reform of the police of Northern Ireland 2000-2007 and is currently a member of the UN's International Police Advisory Committee and its Global Police Policy Community advisory group.
