**ESRC-Data First PhD Scholarship**

Paolo Campana has secured an ADR-UK/ESRC 'Data First' PhD Scholarship to explore the structure and mechanisms of drug trafficking in England and Wales, leveraging relational information from both the Magistrates' and Crown Courts' records (Data First Criminal Justice Linked Datasets). This is a 3-year PhD scholarship that will be shortly advertised. 'Data First' is ambitious initiative led by the Ministry of Justice that aims at promoting the use of linked administrative data for research purposes.

**Klea Ramaj's study on the Return and Reintegration challenges of Albanian victims of human trafficking** conducted during her MPhil in 2019 and supervised by Dr. Paolo Campana has been cited extensively in a recent report by the Home Office, thus showing a great contribution to national and international policymaking. ### **Jerry Lee Studentships**

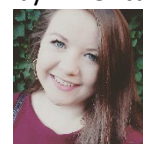

Darrick Jolliffe (Professor of Criminology at the University of Greenwich and Honorary Research Fellow of the Institute) and I have been successful in an application to the Newton Trust for creating the Cambridge Study in Delinquent Development (CSDD) Data Archive. This project will entail digitising all of the records of the world-famous Cambridge Study in Delinquent Development (led by Emeritus Professor David Farrington) and making this available for future research. Dr Hannah Gaffney will be joining the Institute to work with us towards establishing the Cambridge Study in Delinquent Development Data Archive.

The Institute is inviting applications for early career researchers wishing to make an application to the [Leverhulme Trust Early Career Fellowships](#) scheme. To be eligible, you must have submitted your PhD no earlier than 23 February 2019 and not later than 4pm on 23 February 2023 (subject to a couple of exceptions).
