Reform of the police and Criminal Justice system is widely regarded as problematic. Explanations commonly invoked include the people (culture) or the situation (structures). Framing of the problem in this way, plays down implementation issues of adoption and workability of proposals for change, reducing the likelihood of success. Can police officers and politicians charged with changing the system, in austerity, learn the lessons or are they framed by their roles? This lecture is based on emerging findings from interviews with top reformers. Examples cited range from Anti Social behaviour to rehabilitation of offenders.
