Why does violence cluster in a few 'hot spots' across the globe? What can we do to reduce and prevent them? With the 'paradox of state strength and weakness' as her point of departure, Professor Susanne Karstedt discusses how key insights from criminology and the policing of 'hot spots' in cities can be taken to the global level.

Susanne Karstedt (PhD (or: Dr. rer.pol.), University of Bielefeld), is Professor of Criminology and Criminal Justice at the School of Law, University of Leeds, and Director of its Centre for Criminal Justice Studies. Her main research interests are cross-national and cross cultural analyses of violence and mass atrocities, crime and justice; her present research addresses the impact of democracy and democratic values on a range of crime and justice outcomes. In 2005, she received the Christa-Hoffmann-Riehm Award for Socio-Legal Studies from the German Association for Law and Society; in 2006, the Award of Recognition for Outstanding Services to the International Society of Criminology; and in 2007, the Sellin-Glueck-Award of the American Society of Criminology.
