Until now our only insight into sentencing practices has come from one-off studies or descriptive annual sentencing statistics. The new Crown Court Sentencing Survey is derived directly from sentencers, and therefore permits multivariate analyses which offer unique and fresh insight into sentencing practices. This seminar summarises recent findings and sheds new light on the use of aggravating and mitigating factors.

Julian Roberts is a professor of Criminology in the Faculty of Law, University of Oxford and Associate Editor of the European Journal of Criminology. His books include: Popular Punishment (Oxford University Press, 2014, with J. Ryberg); Sentencing Guidelines (OUP, 2013, with A. Ashworth); Sentencing for Murder (Hart, 2012, with B. Mitchell); Aggravation and Mitigation at Sentencing (CUP, 2011); Previous Convictions at Sentencing (Hart, 2010 with A. von Hirsch); Punishing Persistent Offenders (2008; OUP) Understanding Public attitudes to Criminal Justice (OUP, 2005 with M. Hough) and The Virtual Prison (CUP, 2005).
