

Victims of Terrorism in Israel: The Role of Restorative Justice

Conceptually, both public opinion and state authorities make a clear distinction between victims of crime and victims of terrorism. My research focuses on this distinction in terms of state compensation, public attention and social care provided to the different types of victims. Restorative Justice process is open to victims of crime, is it open to victims of terrorism too?

Dr. Uri Yanay conducts his research and teaches at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem, School of Social Work and Social Welfare. Trained as a case worker Uri studied social policy and teaches courses on the personal social services, 'victimhood', conflict resolution and mediation, and program evaluation.
